SALA Festival is the world's largest open access visual arts festival and a jewel in South Australia's crown. It is a truly inclusive festival, embracing the essence of community and celebrating amateur and professional visual arts creatives at all stages of their practice. SALA imposes no restrictions as to what can be called a gallery in the month of August each year. It issues an invitation to get involved and be brave.

This year over 10,534 artists created and exhibited work for 712 exhibitions across the entire state of SA the 2024 South Australian Living Artists (SALA) Festival and audiences exceeded 1,200,000.

South Australia offers a unique creative environment, which has resulted in the state being home to an exceptional community of artists. Artists thrive in South Australia. SALA Festival was founded to celebrate this, and to draw attention to the exceptional artists who live and create in the state of South Australia, and its unique visual arts ecology.

As an open access festival, SALA understands the importance of cultivating not only artists but audiences. Audiences are integral to the visual artists community. Each year we plan a program that engages local artists to deliver visual arts experiences that provide entry into different corners of the visual arts world and invite the entire community to learn, enjoy and delight in our local artists.

SALA Festival is deliberately inclusive in nature. We aim to nurture artists at all stages of their career and to encourage broad community participation in creative life. We want to encourage more people to create, to communicate and to connect through visual arts, because we know that this is simply part of being human and living well.

The degree to which art and the practice of it within the community serve as a conduit for collective and individual wellbeing becomes apparent each August as SALA Festival explodes across the State. In 2024, we saw a particular rise in the awareness that art plays in the roll of caring for others within our community.

South Australia has a genius for creativity and a great capacity to celebrate and capitalise on this.

History

SALA Festival celebrated its 27th anniversary in 2024. Founded in 1998 as SALA Week, it was established to educate local and inter/national audiences about the unique culture of leading visual artists living and working in South Australia, to promote the individuals and create opportunities for professional artists. In its first year there were 21 metropolitan venues and 20 country venues. Since then, it has become a monthlong celebration of local art throughout the state, with over 700 exhibitions and 10,000 artists.

Purpose

SALA is a state-wide showcase and celebration of South Australia's living visual artists.

It culminates in Australia's largest and most inclusive visual arts festival, which takes place in galleries and non-traditional arts spaces across South Australia annually, during the entire month of August.

Each year, SALA takes the work of around 10,000 emerging, mid-career, and established South Australian artists to more than 600 venues across the state (from sheds, cafés, offices and retail spaces, to wineries, schools, public spaces, galleries, and major arts institutions) to reach local and inter/national audiences of more than 1,200,000 people, and many more online.

Vision

To champion South Australia's living visual artists and draw inter/national attention to the unique and exceptional ecology of visual art in South Australia.

To support South Australian visual artists working at any stage of career and in any medium to make, share and receive recognition for their work.

To enrich and inspire South Australian communities and audiences through their engagement with South Australian visual art, including the large number of 'incidental' arts audiences for whom SALA's local exhibitions are their first point of contact with the arts.

To embed SALA Festival as a vibrant and valued part of all South Australian communities, and inter/nationally recognised as a diverse, democratic, and inclusive visual arts champion that enhances our own and the world's understanding of this unique place and our pride in the art it creates.







Recognising high quality work

SALA Feature Artist

Each year Arts South Australia funds the SA Living Artist Publication. The publication focuses on the production of a major, high-quality book profiling a prominent South Australian visual artist.


The artist selected for the publication becomes SALA's Feature Artist. Their work is profiled in the marketing material for the Festival as we celebrate their work and practice with the wider community. The book is developed and published by Wakefield Press.

Julia Robinson was the subject of the 2024 SA Living Artist publication. Since 2003, Julia Robinson's textile-focused sculpture and installation practice has ruminated on enduring human narratives around sacrifice, sex, and death. Living and working on Kaurna land in Adelaide, South Australia but drawing on the folkloric and, importantly, folk horror traditions of her British ancestry, Robinson conflates humour and horror in ever more unexpected ways. In this, the first major publication dedicated to Robinson's practice, curator Leigh Robb, novelist and poet Hannah Kent, and visual artist Jess Taylor examine her work through their respective lenses and weave together the visual art, literature, folklore, and film most influential to Robinson's practice. The essays and poems contained within are accompanied by reproductions of key works in stunning detail which

reveal the artist's keen understanding of historical costuming and sewing techniques. This monograph surveys over twenty years of a prolific and wildly imaginative visual art practice, that combines exceptional technical skill, fantastical invention and thoroughly researched cultural touchstones.

During the 2024 SALA Festival, Robinson's work could be seen at the Art Gallery of South Australia, and at Adelaide Central Gallery. A total of 26 books have been published since 2000, profiling artists Julia Robinson, Helen Fuller, Mark Valenzuela, Roy Ananda, Kirsten Coelho, Louise Haselton, Clare Belfrage, Christopher Orchard, Catherine Truman, Giles Bettison, Nicholas Folland, Stephen Bowers, Mark Kimber, Hossein Valamanesh, Khai Liew, Angela Valamanesh, Gerry Wedd, Julie Blyfield, Aldo lacobelli, Michelle Nikou, Deborah Paauwe, lan W. Abdullah, Nick Mount, James Darling, Kathleen Petyarre, and Annette Bezor.



SALA Solo Photographic Opportunity

Bus Tours

SALA 2024 offered bus tours, visiting both galleries and artists' studio. Attendees had the unique opportunity to engage with artists, gain insights into their creative processes and explore their studios.

The Adelaide Hills to Karoonda Lights Bus Tour took to the hills and beyond for a day tour to Hahndorf Academy, a behind-the-scenes look at the new centre of Ondeen, an exclusive park tour at Monarto Safari Park, and dinner under the stars at the Karoonda Lights opening event. Attendees enjoyed a dedicated artist guide, lunch at Ondeen, exclusive mini tour of Monarto Safari Park, all you can eat pizza at Karoonda Lights and artist talks. This tour was led by artist OAKEY and supported by the District Council of Karoonda East Murray, Mount Barker District Council and Monarto Safari Park.

The Port Adelaide Enfield bus tour celebrated MELTFest with a behind the scenes look at art venues from Klemzig to the Port. Attendees heard from artists, watched workshops, and finished off with a wander through the Handmade Night Markets. Open Studios

During SALA 2024 there were 85 open studios and 54 artist demonstrations. The Open Studios and artist demonstrations give people an opportunity to meet the artists and learn more about how they work.

SALA in Schools

Every year South Australian schools and early learning centres register exhibitions of student artwork to be part of the Festival in August. This provides young people with real exhibition experience and places them in the same program as some of the state's most established artists. It also provides the wider South Australian community with a glimpse at our future artists.

SALA Festival is proud to have I-Nex as our Education Partner, supporting the visual arts in schools and school participation in the festival.

- A total of 58 exhibitions were registered by schools for the 2024 SALA Festival program, highlighting strong interest and participation.
- The program saw engagement from 2,000+ students, school staff members and community members in the exhibitions.
- We saw school exhibitions spanned 20 council areas across South Australia.


Jarvis Škoda Art Cars
